Farfara 2031


Research project (ongoing)

A site-specific exhibition in an abandoned family house, celebrating the exhilaration, intimacy and beauty of the clubbing scene, at a time when clubs all over Europe are closed. The empty house reflected the sense of loneliness experienced by covid-19 restrictions.

A reinterpretation of the aesthetic of the 'salott' into the outside world, recreating the atmosphere of respectability alongside a large construction site in the middle of a close-knit town, literally bringing the *kamra* (room) *barra* (outside).
